Dear Friends

I have started compiling these thoughts as the rain hammers down whilst the wind howls around the house: storm Imogen is making a felt presence! This winter has seen a pilot project between the Met Office and Met Eireann in "naming" storms. We've had Abigail, Barney, Desmond, Eva, Frank and so on. Some of these have hit us whilst others have focussed their fury on other parts of the country and we certainly remember people who have been flooded or suffered storm damage, not least in Cumbria.

Within the Gospels is a passage about Jesus and some of his closest friends who are caught in a storm. Jesus is asleep and eventually it looks like the boat will sink but still Jesus slumbers, his friends in panic awake him and he said "Peace be still" and we are told, "The wind dropped and there was a deep calm.

It is like that in life. As we grow from childhood, to maturity we have our storms and frightening moments. Into these situations we very much want to hear Jesus' words, "Peace be still." Yet sometimes we forget that Christ did not only calm the storm for the disciples but was also with them during the storm whilst it raged.

The word "peace" is also very much associated with Easter, how many times does Jesus use this word to his still grief stricken followers following his resurrection. At the very end of Matthew's Gospel there is a promise, "I am with you always even until the end of the age." Wherever we find ourselves, be it a time of calm or storm may we experience the presence of Jesus, who in the midst of the storm says "Peace be still."

Street Pastors - 17 active members, but need to have a minimum of 22. There are 24 prayer pastors but only a small group meet at the hall. They go out every Friday and 4th Saturday but with some teams reduced to 3 instead of 4 pastors. They are considering going out on Saturdays which is a busier night instead of Fridays.

Cornerstone – have been successful with a couple of grant bids, so finances are coming in to set up a Mobile Cornerstone to go out into the villages and hospitals. There are three sessions a week – Monday, Wednesday and Friday and in the first year they have had 500 episodes of assistance. More volunteers always welcome. Thank you for prayer and financial support for the main Cornerstone.

PROPERTY NEWS

I'm sure you have all noticed how lovely and bright the new lighting is in the Foyer, and two outside lights will also be put up soon. We have found a sympathetic electrician who understands what we are trying to do - i.e. bring our building up to current safety standards whilst spending our money wisely. This work has been paid for from our current account.

The Shepherd Window will be accessed by a working platform to be erected when the old School Room is scaffolded for the ceiling repairs. In previous times, leaded glass was "finished" using tallow and it may be that it is this tallow which needs cleaning off and/or replacing. We will know the full extent of the problem when we have the window laid flat on a table in the Vestry for closer inspection.

We recently had the 5-yearly inspection of the building and one item mentioned was the position of the gas meter. Not very user-friendly, it is currently under the stairs and Hilary can sometimes be found on her knees with a torch to get an accurate reading. The meter needs to be moved to an outside wall so that in the event of an emergency, the supply can be isolated.

All these tasks can only happen if and when we have the funds to carry out the work. It's worth pointing out that our Offerings just about meet the Assessment. Our church is noted for being warm but this comes at a cost – the winter quarter averages £1500 for the three coldest months and the various lettings fees help toward this cost.

On a more positive note, the refurbishments in the old School Room will be going ahead very soon as we are within £500 of the target needed to cover the projected costs. Of course there will be added extras – things we cannot plan for but which need to be addressed. I am sure the outcome will be something we can all be proud of and, just like the refreshment area in the Foyer, we will very quickly get used to the facilities and forget how it was before. *Pauline*
