Pastoral letter from Area Superintendent Minister

When have you been truly joyful? The roar of a steam engine, a goal in the cup final? the birth of a child? A huge box of chocolates. Joy is described as a feeling of great pleasure and happiness. Yes, I am sure that chocolate does that, but how long does it last before the guilt of diet breaking, *intrudes on such a guilty pleasure?*

Let me tell you a story about a man who emigrated to America to begin a new life. He was not rich, so sold everything he owned, everything!

Church Meeting 19 February 2023 Our Vision for our Christian Witness

20 members were present and apologies were received from Linda Gibbs, Hilda Hanks, Margaret Stanley and Barry Treadwell.

Our Vision for: - a) The Community - the clubs and societies that use our building, b) Children's work - Family Days, Junior Church, Toddlers Worship,

- c) Coffee mornings, d) Supporting our own congregation.
- i) Are we equipped to meet their needs? (Leadership, volunteers, finances)
- ii) What changes do we think we need to improve
- a) the building for them? b) our witness to them?

We agreed that we want to look at the future needs of our town and how our church building can serve our town after our current (older) generation has passed on.

We discussed some of the problems facing us and suggested some solutions:

- 1. We recognised that the Property Committee has worked very hard for the past 3 years and agreed to establish a Refurbishment Committee to take on any new tasks for the building as it is unreasonable and unfair to expand the Property Committee's remit. Four volunteers, Polly Boswell, Helen Dawson, Rev Susan Holden and Marion Hornby were accepted by the meeting to take on Refurbishment duties.
- 2. Susan Holden will ask Rev Tracey Lewis to visit our church building and advise us on practical problems/solutions. We will consider getting professional advice as our plans firm up.
- 3. We spoke about weekday children's events, Warminster Action Group, improved toilets (suitable for adults with learning/physical disabilities), improved acoustics and shading in the Cameo Room, up-dating and re-siting the boiler, Warm and Safe, Eco-Church funding, removing the vestry, kitchen and toilets entirely and constructing a new build to suit our future needs. looking into the flooring and waste flow problems under the Cameo Room and ensuring we follow all safety guidelines.
- 4. We will hold a series of Gift Days for the church members to show that we support this exciting new venture and are prepared to fund raise towards it. In addition, the Refurbishment Committee will explore funding from our church parent bodies.
- 5. It was suggested inviting other organisations to use our Coffee Mornings to raise money for their charities, to increase outreach and awareness of our presence
- 6. During the discussion we recognised that we own the Garden Area but the deeds need to be deposited in our safe.

Our meeting ended (at 12.40) with prayers to thank God for guiding our discussion and encouraging us towards exciting new plans.

A MESSAGE From REVD HEATHER

At the Church Meeting held on 19th February, the members present voted in favour of a Gift Day or more accurately, a Gift fortnight over the Easter period, 2-16 April.

A Refurbishment Group was set up to bring forward ideas and plans for the refurbishment of the vestry, kitchen and toilets. When these are eventually approved by the Church Meeting, funding may be applied for from the Methodist and United Reformed Churches.

However, before funding can be applied for, we, as a Church, must show that we will be contributing to the work by raising a certain level of funds for the project.

With this in mind, Gift Envelopes will be available from Palm Sunday, 2nd April. We hope that you will feel able to support us in this necessary work as we seek to witness to our community. The URC and Methodist leadership are looking to equip ordinary Christians to work practically in the Church" All of which means we all need to think about the part we play in the life of our Church. CHRISTMAS SHOE BOXES

We hope to be able to send Christmas shoe boxes to the appeal again this year.

Every year, the teams of Foundation for Social Change and Inclusion from Bulgaria and the UK organize this campaign and give out thousands of Christmas boxes to underprivileged children, families and groups. Some of them live in terrible poverty and their budget will not allow anything special for the holidays. Others have no family or friends to share the holiday with.

The Christmas boxes go to children aged 0-18 in residential units; children deprived of parental care; women and children who are victims of abuse; women rescued from trafficking; single parents; families in crisis; families of prisoners; old people in specialised homes; lonely elderly and others.

The presents bring joy to people in difficult situations and make them feel special and loved. For some of the people a Christmas box is the only present they will get this year. The presents give the opportunity to reach people in difficult situations and to build relationships of trust in order to help them long-term.

In previous years Brenda Goodwin has done the lion's share of the work in organising the shoe boxes we have sent. Although Brenda wants to still be involved, she needs more help and support from others within our church.

We will start putting the box out to collect items to go in the boxes after Easter. Please start to bring items along weekly. Items required:

- Clothing: Hats, gloves, scarves, knickers/pants, socks, babygros
- **Stationery**: Pens, felt tips, pencils, crayons, notebooks, colouring books, pencil sharpeners, erasers
- Toiletries: soap, flannel, toothpaste, toothbrush, combs, roll on deodorant, small shampoos, tissues
- **Toys**: (all small to fit in shoebox), cars, dolls, balls, skipping ropes, jigsaws, puppets etc nothing military and nothing with words.
- Other: hair slides, scrunchies, Alice bands etc, children's jewellery.
- Baby items: rattles, dishes, spoons, dummies, soft toys, cardigans/jumpers,
- **Sweets**: please bring later in the year.

Empty shoe boxes and spare Christmas wrapping paper also needed.

Action for Children Collection Boxes
