Dear Friends

Today (February 3rd) all my Sunday services have been cancelled due to snow and especially ice. It seems ironic that these thoughts, compiled in the depth of winter, will be in the edition of the church magazine that will cover up to June. A popular hymn includes a reference to such climatic extremes in a verse:

"Summer and winter, and springtime and harvest, Sun, moon and stars in their courses above, Join with all nature in manifold witness To thy great faithfulness, mercy and love..."

Words from "Great is thy faithfulness", written by the American Thomas Chisolm. He was born in Franklin, Kentucky on 29th of July 1866 in a log cabin. Aged 16 he became a school teacher before finding faith and training as a Methodist minister, ill health meant he could serve for just one year. He wrote over 1200 sacred poems but it was not until he was aged 57 that he compiled, "Great is thy faithfulness".

On being asked why he wrote it, Chisolm replied simply: "I must not fail to record here the unfailing faithfulness of a covenantkeeping God and that He has given me many wonderful displays of His providing care, for which I am filled with astonishing gratefulness."

The words remind that God not only works in dramatic or miraculous ways but it also in the simple, everyday.

The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. 'The LORD is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him.' *Lamentations 3 v 22-24*

Wherever the coming months take you, may you know the presence, love and compassion of Christ.

PROPERTY

The work to the gable ends of the roof on the Cameo room and vestry /kitchen building have been completed quickly despite bad weather. A fire klaxon has been fitted outside the kitchen door, outside lighting has been improved and a shed has been erected and is ready for use. Work will soon start on improving the garden area with screening, seating and planting. The roof work has helped with the damp in the vestry and to further aid this the radiators in that room are to be changed for greater efficiency.

Lettings have continued to increase with rents of £850 last quarter and 38 activities booked during the 28 days of February! This is a busy church.
